Airdrie Clarkston Church has been so blessed by the number of people, who, over the years have served God. So many acts of service, big and small, have blessed the church, and those our church is called to minister to within our parish.

Many of those belonging to the congregation of Clarkston have served as Elders or as Board members, and we are so grateful for their leadership and faithfulness.

Earlier this year a number of our Elders were recognised for their long service. This was during a special service of thanksgiving for the long service for many of the Elders across the Presbytery. The service took place at an evening service held at Hamilton St Johns Parish Church. The past Moderator of The General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, the Very Reverend Sally Foster-Fulton, was there to award certificates. Thirteen of our Elders were recognised - some for 25 years, some 30 years, some 40 years and one of our Elders was recognised for 60 years of service! Our church surely has been blessed by so many faithful years of service and for that we do give thanks to God.

As I write this, we are preparing to ordain a new Elder. This specific individual has agreed to use their God given skills for the continued work of Jesus within

our community. It is amazing to think that the ministry that Jesus began 2,000 years ago is continued to this day and that we are all called to play our part in God's unfolding plan of human redemption.

The liturgy that is used when ordaining an Elder is beautiful – I find it always convicts me afresh as a Christian to be aware of not hiding my light under a bushel (as the song goes!)

The opening words of the liturgy of ordination, taken from 1 Corinthians 12, go like this –

There are different gifts, but it is the same Spirit who gives them. There are different ways of serving God but it is the same Lord who is served.

Every single person who is a part of our church family offers their own forms of service to God. Together, we are the body of Jesus here on earth and we are all called and equipped by the Spirit to serve in our own unique way. The Holy Spirit gives each and every one of us different individual gifts. We all have so much to give and as we follow God, we will come to know how best to use those gifts and skills.

Sometimes we may look at other Christians and when we measure ourselves against them, we may feel inadequate and disheartened. But that is not how it should be – we must remember 'there are different gifts, but it is the same spirit who gives them.'

I pray that God may give you wisdom as how to use the gifts you have been given. It might be writing a letter to someone you haven't seen in a while or giving them a phone call. It may be to pray. It may be to show hospitality. It may be to visit those in hospital. It may be to speak a word in season to someone going through a hard time. All of these acts, big or small, are ways in which we serve the God of love as He works to reconcile all things in heaven and on earth to Himself through the blood of His Son, our Lord Jesus Christ.

Let us always remember that the church is the body of Christ in this place. That means that we are called to be Jesus' arms, stretched out open in love. We are called to be Jesus' legs that we might journey with people on their exploration of faith. We are called to be Jesus' mouth as we speak words of good news, peace, and love.

Let us rejoice in the service of all our members, Elders and Congregational Board members. Let us give thanks for the service offered in the past, offered in the present, and the service that will be offered in the future. Let us remember that (Continued on page 4)

Four churches moving together as one: an update

The Presbytery Plan was agreed at the end of April that for ourselves the four churches – Cairnlea, Calderbank, Chapelhall and Clarkston – should move towards becoming a single unit. There will be two full-time ministry posts. Determinations have to be made on all the buildings at the latest by June 2027.

What next?

The formal agreement of the Plan has two final stages at the Presbytery and General Assembly level, which will probably be settled by the beginning of June.

Work needs to be done especially in Calderbank and Chapelhall* to assess what buildings are most essential for mission. In part that will involve giving consideration to all the physical options open to us.

Work also needs to be done, involving all four congregations,

A fundraising group has been set up to raise money to upgrade and maintain the Church Halls for future use. From now until June 2025 there will be a calendar of fundraising on what the detail would be of becoming a single unit, with two full-time ministry posts. How would this team ministry operate? How would decision-making happen under the authority of a single Kirk Session? What worshipping patterns would be offered? And what new things would we aim for in terms of mission and service? Under these four questions there is a lot of detail to be talked through, and the hope is that representatives of the congregations will set to doing just that over the summer.

We all want to be able to ask the right questions and so little by little discern the right answers! Because there is so much to think about in the detail, the strategy we reckon is to get small groups drawing up a first stage of proposals. Then larger numbers of people – not just Elders, but all of us in our congregations – may then have

events which will be advertised on the Church website, Facebook page and in church intimations and there will be something for everybody to enjoy. There is also a new something concrete to assess, comment on, refine and improve. If at all possible, we shall start that wider consultation process in the autumn of this year.

So, to be clear. The Presbytery Mission Plan, which is broad in outline, is all but finally agreed. The details of its implementation – how it will actually work in practice – are now needing our attention. Please join your prayers for this challenging exercise: that all we consider and come to make decisions on may help us to grow as people who are a "*dwelling place of God in the Spirit*" (Ephesians 2:22).

*The Plan has already determined that the buildings at Cairnlea will be retained, as will the Church Hall at Clarkston; and that the church building at Clarkston will be closed.
